

Corrections

This document describes errors that have been found in the submitted thesis. Sentences set in brackets are corrected.

Definitions section: “salient” should have been explained like this: “**Salient:** ‘most noticeable or important, something that stands out as prominent’ (Cambridge Dictionary, n.d.)”.

Page 1: the WHO reference lacked a comma: “Little progress has been made in reducing the rising trends in overweight and obesity to date (WHO, 2016).”

Page 2: OHCHR was used in the main text for the first time without spelling out the organisations’ full title: “Human rights are a set of entitlements and protections inherent to all human beings, enshrined in international human right law and thus legally binding on states that have ratified international human rights treaties (OHCHR [Office of the High Commissioner on Human Rights], n.d.-g).”




Figure 1. Conceptual framework of factors influencing food environments and diets. The figure is adapted from Swinburn et al. (2013)

Page 8: The text boxes in Figure 1 contained Word spell check flags.

Page 10: the WHO reference referred to WHO EURO: “WHO EURO (2016) also suggests that food marketers, particularly in digital media, employ strategies that stimulate emotional

responses that are processed differently than cognition and that are subsequently harder for children to recognise and resist.”

Page 10: The following sentence lacked full stop punctuation: “Power is sometimes equated with persuasiveness or persuasive power (Kraak & Story, 2015).”

Page 11: the word *states* was written with a capital S. “In addition, states should set up mechanisms for monitoring the policy implementation and evaluate its impacts (WHO, 2010).”

Page 13: The verb imply was conjugated as plural: “The obligation to respect implies that states must refrain from interfering with the human rights of individuals or groups.”

Page 20: the following paragraph contained a line shift:

“(…) some small and medium-sized enterprises can have severe human rights impacts, which will require corresponding measures regardless of their size. Severity of impacts will be judged by their scale, scope and irremediable character.” (OHCHR, 2011, p.15).

Page 29: the following sentence contained a reference that was formatted wrongly:

“Qualitative content analysis was performed using the description in Merriam (2014) as a guide.”

Page 36: the following sentence contained the fragments of a “the” that should be omitted.

“The texts were then re-read and data units that were meaningful for the research questions were highlighted.”

Page 38: “presented” lacked an n: “Factors concerning external validity, or transferability, are presented in section 3.5.2.”

Page 87: footnote 13 contained a conjugation mistake. “The report was not included in the present review after all inclusion criteria were applied.”

Page 101: “nature of obesity” was conjugated as plural. “(…) suggesting that the multifactorial and slowly evolving nature of obesity challenges the assumption that food marketing to children may be regarded a salient human rights issue (…)”.

Page 104: “indicate” was conjugated as plural. “This thesis indicates that food marketing is interpreted as a human rights issue in human rights documents and in the human rights system.”
